
About our Cover

MICA Names its 2019 Humanitarian of the Year

On Sunday, March 11, before a crowd of more than 3,000 individuals at Marco Island Residents' Beach, the MICA Board of Directors presented its 2019 Humanitarian of the Year Award to the consummate volunteer and humanitarian, Allyson Richards!

MICA's President Kathryn Sullivan stated that Allyson is a caring friend to so many and has made volunteering her job. She has spent countless hours volunteering with Our Daily Bread Food Pantry, the Marco Island Charter Middle School, the Marco Island YMCA, the Marco Island Historical Society, the American Cancer Society of Marco Island, among many other causes.

The children at Marco Island Charter Middle School were lucky to have Allyson on their board of directors and as chair of their 20th anniversary celebration and other events, raising much-needed funds for school programs.

On Marco there is a daily Bread Run, taking bread from Publix and Winn Dixie every day from Marco Island to the 6L's Farm migrant workers. Through the YMCA, Allyson coordinates the program and drivers, and ensures that the bread is delivered to those who need it.

MICA's Vice President, Ray McChesney, continued listing Allyson's humanitarian acts. Through "Our Daily Bread Food Pantry" and the Marco Island YMCA, Allyson has worked to perfect "Lunch with Friends Over 60." Each month this luncheon brings together seniors who would normally be in their homes alone. She arranges for transportation if needed and has recently added entertainment to the luncheons. They even outgrew their original location at the Family Church and are now up to 110 attendees at the Lutheran Church!

When a mom was in tremendous need with her newborn baby sleeping in a laundry basket, Allyson sought out donations for the new mom and delivered everything to her doorstep.

Katherine O'Hara, MICA's Secretary, picked up where Ray left off by reminding that Allyson spurred all of us island wide over the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays that just passed to "fill the trailer" with non-perishable food. The food was then delivered to the "Our Daily Bread Food Pantry."

By the way, the "trailer" is a cargo trailer Allyson's husband, Jim, bought for her, and that she tows behind her car! It has come in quite handy over the last couple of years.

It was also used last year to distribute food to the families of Manatee School children via Al's Pals, Allyson and friends' mobile food pantry. Each Friday afternoon they drove the trailer to the school and distributed surplus food to help augment the meals of hungry and hardworking families.

Allyson's latest project is collecting jeans and sturdy shoes for the migrant farm workers at 6L's Farm just up the road.

She is on the Board of Directors of the Marco Island Historical Society and the Newcomers Club. Even when not on the board of directors, Allyson has headed up events or raised funds for the Marco Island Center for the Arts and the American Cancer Society.

She has volunteered as a member of the City of Marco Island Parks and Recreation Committee for several years, ensuring that our city parks and programs are meeting the needs of our community now and in the future.

The MICA Humanitarian of the Year Award is one of the most prestigious awards on Marco

Island. This esteemed award was developed in 1998 to honor the unsung heroes of Marco Island, the people who do so much for so many. The wonderful, positive people you do not hear much about.

Allyson joins recent recipients, including Cheryl and Mike Mueller, Al Bismonte, Dennis and Joan Pidherny, the Super Team of Five from "Our Daily Bread Food Pantry" and Bernardo Bezos.

On Saturday, February 23, local residents and visitors were treated to "Discover Tigertail", where many mysteries of this unique park were uncovered. Hosted by Friends of Tigertail, eight learning stations provided information about the natural fauna and flora that inhabit the area, as well as the Conservancy hospital that cares for local sick and injured animals. Children set out on a scavenger hunt after decorating pails to hold items found at each station, and adults filled out a questionnaire with information learned at each table, receiving a prize for their efforts.

On the lagoon beach, interactive activities allowed participants to look through a scope to see the resident osprey family in their nest, and to try

their hand at using a seining net to catch some of the small animals and fish in the lagoon. With its tidal lagoon and Gulf of Mexico beaches, home to unusual birds, fish, shells, turtles, and plants, Tigertail Beach is more than a place to sunbathe. Children and adult participants came away with expanded knowledge about the park, while having a fun morning.

With a mission to educate, as well as preserve and protect the park, Friends of Tigertail hosts several activities throughout the year, as well as sponsoring students at the Conservancy summer camp.



Visitors to Marco Island often talk about "the two B's" that make their trip to paradise unforgettable-the beach and the Bargain Basket. With new items constantly on display, the Bargain Basket is always a popular spot for visitors and residents to shop for treasures.

United Church of Marco Island members, Ruby Rutherford and Betty Ringler dreamt of operating a successful thrift store that would provide income for the church in addition to providing funds for the local community. In January of 1975, The Bargain Basket Thrift Store, a ministry of the United Church of Marco Island, opened for the first time in a former coin laundry on Collier Blvd.

The store has come a long way in nearly 45 years. As the oldest and only thrift store on the Island, The Bargain Basket is now located at 750 Bald Eagle Dr. and provides around 5,000 square feet of products including clothing, jewelry, housewares, linens, books, media, and more.

The Bargain Basket thrives off the help of over 130 hard working volunteers in addition to countless donors and shoppers. Thanks to their support, the store has experienced record-breaking sales, allowing over \$100,000 to be donated to local and national charities each year.

The Bargain Basket holds a lot of excitement Monday through Saturday. Donations stream into the back room from 9am-3pm, customers wait outside to be the first ones in the store at 10am, and they shop until last call at 4pm. On popular sale days, the line to get into the store goes clear out to the street and down the sidewalk. Volunteers and staff move quickly and efficiently, working to keep merchandise constantly moving.

Whether it's the busiest part of season or the slowest day of summer, The Bargain Basket holds many opportunities. For some, it provides the opportunity to keep busy as a volunteer and give back to not one, but many, local organizations. For others, it's the place to go when you need just one more wine glass for a dinner party. For the local treasure hunters, it's a place to visit daily, checking for the hidden bargain that will

Marco City Councilor Appointed to Water Management District

Congratulations to Charlette Roman on her appointment by Governor Ron DeSantis to the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) on February 21, 2019.

It is policy of the Florida State Legislature that the state's water resources be managed at a state and regional level. The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is responsible for the water resources at the state level and exercises general supervisory authority over the state's five water management districts.



The five water management districts include the Northwest Florida Water Management District (WMD), the Suwannee River WMD, the St. Johns River WMD, the Southwest Florida WMD, and the South Florida WMD, which Marco Island falls under.

The four core mission areas of the water management districts are water supply, water quality, flood protection and floodplain management, and natural systems. Among other responsibilities, there are primary ways that the water management districts implement these mission areas.

Seven individuals have been newly appointed by Governor DeSantis to the SFWMD with two more seats to be filled. They have a huge task ahead of them with a massive water system in South Florida consisting of 2,200 miles of canals, 2,100 miles of levees and 670 water control structures! We wish them all the best and will be following along on their journey for water quality and supply in the years ahead.

It is our responsibility as water safety advocates to make sure that all children have the knowledge and skills to be safe around water.

Whether you are a resident of Marco Island or you are vacationing on this beautiful island oasis, it is important to keep in mind that water access is everywhere. Luckily, opportunities to teach children how to be safe around water are just as accessible.

The Greater Marco Family YMCA offers group swimming lessons to all ages including a parent/child lesson for children under 3. Private lessons are also offered year-round and provide a flexible schedule for vacationers looking for a fun water safety activity during a stay on Marco Island. YMCA members will receive discounted rates for swim lessons and many other programs. Membership is a great way to be involved in our community! Another opportunity for water safety offered by the Greater Marco Family YMCA is the new Puddle Jumper Program. If you do not have a lifejacket for your





child or grandchild, you can borrow a U.S. Coast Guard approved Puddle Jumper from the YMCA for free during your stay on Marco Island!

If you are headed over to the beach, don't forget to pick up a beach lifejacket provided by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and NCH Safe and Healthy Children's Coalition of Collier County. You can easily borrow a beach lifejacket at any of the lifejacket stations found at every public access point along our shores. The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary also offers boater safety classes if you are headed out for a day at sea.

In any case, it is important to also know how to respond to an aquatic emergency. CPR classes are offered by both the YMCA and the Marco Island Fire Department. The Marco Island Deed Restrictions

In October 1986, The Marco Island Civic Association (MICA) was assigned the responsibility of enforcement of the declaration of restrictions. The declarations were placed and recorded for properties developed by the Deltona Corporation on Marco Island up to that date. Deltona created the deed restrictions to protect the integrity of the island and to assure conformity of all new construction in the geographic areas protected by the restrictions. As a general note: deed restrictions are an excellent tool for maintaining property values.

A condition of the agreement between Deltona and MICA was to create an Architectural Review Committee (ARC) which would act as an authority in the construction review process. Among others, the restrictions state that no new construction shall take place without a review and written approval of the design drawings by the ARC. The ARC is composed of individual volunteers who have a background in construction. Since 1986, the ARC continues to meet monthly. Of particular interest to the committee are setback requirements.

The deed restrictions cover single family residences, multi-family residential and commercial properties on the island and apply to most of the island. Areas not included are properties located North of Old Marco Lane in Old Marco; the Highlands area; The Esplanade, Hideaway, Key Marco and a portion of beachfront properties. In deed restricted areas, construction drawings must be submitted to the ARC for review.

The deed restrictions differ somewhat from the City of Marco Island's Code of Ordinances. In cases where the restrictions don't match, the more conservative of the two must be met. Corner and shoulder lots have unique requirements and a meeting with the MICA Deed Restriction Specialist is encouraged prior to final design.

MICA works closely with the City of Marco Island Building Department. Although our requirements vary, if MICA observes a violation of City codes, we will notify the City. In return, on the City's application for a building permit, there is a notification to check with MICA for applicable deed restrictions.

If you are planning on building a new home or commercial building or adding a new screen enclosure, pool or addition, please call the MICA office at 239-642-7778 to verify if deed restrictions run with your property. The application for ARC review may be downloaded at www.marcocivic.com.

Highlights of the New City of Marco Island Listed Species Ordinance

The City of Marco Island is reaching out to all contractors who conduct business on the Island to share with you the highlights of our new Listed Species Ordinance #19-01 that became effective on January 7, 2019. If you do any work that includes, but is not limited to, seawall repairs, construction/repairs of new single family homes or commercial businesses, use of vacant lots for staging lots, and the trimming or removal of native or exotic vegetation, this information will be valuable to you.

You may be aware that Marco Island is home to many diverse species of wildlife, including those that are listed as "threatened" and are protected by state and federal law. These species may be present on the properties you conduct work on or adjacent to. In order to avoid impacting these species and their habitat, and potentially violating local, state and federal laws, we would like you to be aware of this ordinance and ask that you share it with your team. Please be aware and drive slow in areas known for gopher tortoise crossings.

Burrowing Owls

Protection zone requirements now match the setback guidelines established by the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) for specific activities within the vicinity of Burrowing Owl burrows:

- a. 10-foot buffer in all directions around the entrance of Burrowing Owl burrows during the non-breeding season (July 11 through February 14).
- b. 33-foot buffer in all directions around the entrance of Burrowing Owl burrows during the breeding season (February 15 through July 10).

Burrowing Owls & Gopher Tortoises

• For sites where a listed species is found, a protection zone, consisting of silt fencing, must be erected prior to construction activities, and should be installed around two to three sides of each affected burrow, leaving one or two sides open for species ingress and egress. All protection zone enclosures must be removed upon work completion.

- Protection zones can only be entered by an Authorized or Registered Agent, property owner, FWC, and trained City or Audubon staff, volunteers or consultants.
- To prevent unnecessary disturbance, take or burrow collapse, operation and parking of any vehicles or equipment is prohibited within 33' of Burrowing Owl burrows and 25' of Gopher Tortoise burrows.

Additional Points to Note

Feeding any wildlife is prohibited in the City, except the use of bird feeders at least 300 feet from any designated conservation area.

To protect the regionally significant populations of beach-nesting birds and migratory flocks within the City, the following policies are in effect:

- a. No trespassing in posted or closed nesting or habitat areas (protection zones).
- b. Fireworks, dogs and other lethal disturbance sources are prohibited on beaches.
- c. Aerial disturbances are prohibited within 500 feet of posted avian listed species nests or habitats.

Penalties

Violation of this Ordinance will now be subject to the following penalties:

1st Offense: \$ 150 - \$ 5002nd Offense: \$ 500 - \$1,500

• 3rd Offense: \$1,500 - \$2,500

Other Friendly Reminders

Vacant lots are privately owned property. Entering a vacant lot without permission of the property owner is considered a trespassing violation. A Construction Temporary Use Permit must be obtained through the City prior to using a vacant lot. You must also obtain permission from the property owner.

Prohibited uses on vacant lots include:

- Dumping debris or trash.
- Storage of construction equipment or materials.
- Parking of vehicles, boats or RVs.

Please do your part to keep all trash and debris contained on work sites so it does not end up on adjacent lots, on our roads, or in our canals and waterways. Thank you!

The conversation was exciting and energizing. Our dreams are beginning to come true. This is what we have been hoping for and working toward! We have worked for years to create a community centered around the arts. Yes, there are some big issues that need work, but at least we are moving forward!

The residents have stated very clearly they don't want more housing, so the CRA is working to add green space, a performing arts center, a large parking lot, some scattered commercial, etc., and they have the perfect 17 acres for the plan! The best thing

Learning About Dolphins

The Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA) of 1972 requires that population stocks of marine mammals be assessed regularly and that estimates of their abundance be reported in the U.S. Marine Mammal Stock Assessment Reports.

The area near Naples and Marco Island is one of the regions where current estimates of dolphin abundance are lacking and where three recent rescues of entangled dolphins have occurred. Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve is partnering with the Chicago Zoological Society's Sarasota Dolphin Research Program to conduct a three-year project in and around Rookery Bay. The project aims to estimate the population size of bottlenose dolphins in the region and build a photographic catalog of identifiable individuals.

During the weeklong survey, the research team observed 69 unique groups of dolphins during six surveys conducted with Rookery Bay staff, recording an estimated 466 total individuals, including 32 calves born in 2018.

Sightings also included an observation of Skipper, a dolphin that Dolphin Research Program staff had disentangled from fishing line and released in 2014. Rookery Bay staff took part in that recovery

effort as part of the Southwest Regional Marine Mammal Stranding Network.

Information collected during this and future studies can be used to monitor the health of dolphins in the region and better assess impacts related to boat strikes and entanglements, as well as events such as oil spills and red tide.

Now celebrating 40 years, Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve is managed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection in cooperation with NOAA and protects 110,000 acres of coastal lands and waters between Naples and Everglades National Park.

Take a "Trip" Through History this Summer at The Marco Island Historical Museum

Visitors to the Marco Island Historical Museum experience an immersive trip through time that spans more than 10,000 years of Marco Island's unique and intriguing pre-history and history. The museum's four permanent exhibits provide a comprehensive and colorful view of the Island's past that engages all ages. There is always something new to experience! Mask making and other interactive experiences, temporary exhibits, concerts, lectures and other entertaining and enlightening programs take place throughout the year.

AND...2019 is truly the year of the cat with the return of the world-famous Key Marco Cat and other rare Pre-Columbian Native American artifacts to their Marco Island home! The artifacts are showcased at the museum now through April 3, 2021 in the expanded permanent exhibit, **Paradise Found: 6,000 Years of People on Marco Island**. More than 21,000 individuals have visited the museum since it opened in January 26, 2019 through March, and the enthusiastic response continues with visitor numbers remaining high.

The Key Marco artifacts were discovered on Marco Island in 1896 during a Smithsonian-sponsored expedition led by Frank Hamilton Cushing. They are on loan from the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Natural History and University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology.

In addition to Paradise Found, permanent exhibits include a unique outdoor gallery - **Windows & Doors to History** - with faux windows and doors that surround the museum complex buildings and frame vivid scenes from Marco Island's Pleistocene, Archaic, Glades and Calusa periods to the pioneer period and modern Marco.

Pioneer Marco: A Tale of Two Villages chronicles the evolution of the island's pioneer villages, offering visitors an in-depth look at the people, industries, and lifestyles on Marco Island during the late 1800s and early 1900s. Rare photographs and objects are brought to life in dynamic and engaging displays, and a full-sized

The fourth permanent exhibit, Modern Marco Island, spans the transformative period beginning in 1962 when the Mackle Brothers, developers and founders of the Deltona Corporation, first visited Marco Island and envisioned its potential for largescale community development. An original Deltona promotional film plays on a vintage television; a suspended model of the early Marco Island Airways airliner "soars" across the gallery; and a replica "Tiki head" from the bow of the early Marco Islander catamaran are just a few of the colorful high points.

The Marco Island Historical Museum is located at 180 S. Heathwood Drive, and is open Tuesday through Saturday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is free and the site is handicapped accessible. For general information call (239) 642-1440 or visit www.colliermuseums.com





Shorebird Nesting Season in Full Swing on Sand Dollar Island

Adam DiNuovo, of Audubon Florida has been working with shorebirds and seabirds on the East, West and Gulf Coast for 20 years. For the last four years, Adam has been a biologist with Audubon Florida (AF) and is also the Collier Shorebird Monitoring and Stewardship Program Manager for Audubon Florida.

Adam has been working hard along with staff of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) setting up postings on Big Marco Pass (also known as Sand Dollar Island). This area is host to large colonies of nesting Least Terns and Black Skimmers for the summer.

According to Brad Cornell of the Audubon of the Western Everglades (AWE), "Marco Island has one of the biggest nesting colonies of Least Terns and Black Skimmers in Florida."

The Wilson's Plover, Least Terns and Black Skimmers have started their breeding behavior on Sand

Dollar Island. These birds make small indentations in the sand called scrapes and lay their eggs out in the open. Sometimes there is a bit of vegetation for camouflage and shelter.

The Wilson's Plover is a year-round resident and they have started laying eggs. They are solitary nesters. They don't like to be near each other and they are actively defending their territories.

The Silly Dance of the Wilson's Plover: The male (with dark neck band) flattens its back and prances around on its tippy toes repeating this multiple times to impress the female. Within 15 days of the dancing routine the female will start to lay eggs. She will lay an egg every day till a third one is laid. Once the chicks hatch and feathers are dry, they are self-sufficient and begin to feed mostly on Fiddlers crab. Expect Wilson's Plover chicks in early May.

The Least Terns are starting to arrive from South America with hundreds sighted on Sand Dollar

Island. Sounding like a chorus of squeaky toys they circle figuring out where they are going to nest. A lot of times, they will pair off with a bird they nested with from the previous year.

The Least Terns and Black Skimmers are colonial nesters and they use "safety in numbers" to defend themselves against predators. Expect Least Tern Chicks around mid-May and Black Skimmer chicks around mid-June.

What you can do to help:

- Respect posted areas.
- Pay attention to bird behavior. They will let you know if you are too close to eggs or chicks.
- Do not feed gulls or crows.
- Pack out your trash.
- Do not flush sitting or resting shorebirds.
- Leave your dog at home.
- Do not fly drones over nesting flocks.

Sharing Our Love of Shells – The Marco Island Shell Club

Marco Island Shell Club has been busy sharing our love of shells and marine life in many new ways. Our members volunteer their time to help raise money to use for scholarships and grants in environmental science and marine biology. As members, we learn about mollusks and other marine life during workshops, monthly seminars and excursions to other shell shows and group shelling trips.

As many of you know, we have Shell Art Workshops on Tuesday mornings for our members from November through March each year. We use many of our local shells to make jewelry, flowers, home décor, frames, mini-shell creations, and holiday items. We sell these items at our two fundraisers. We have a holiday sale on December 3, 2019 and our Shell Show and Sale on March 19-21, 2020. Most of our scholarship and grant money is raised at these events. We have also done several presentations at local libraries and one at a major hotel. Our program, "Shelling on Marco Island," includes a presentation of interesting facts about our local shells that can then be shared with children or grandchildren when they are at the beach. Participants had the opportunity to create a tea light candle ring using local shells. Program attendees were guaranteed they would never look at the beach the same way again! The fees for this program were added to our scholarship fund.

Shell Club members will also teach a summer Children's Shell Art class at the Marco Island Center for the Arts. Children will not only learn how to create some beautiful art using local shells, but they will also learn some scientific information about each shell. Tuition for this class will be added to our scholarship and grant fund.

Our Scholarship Committee had some great suggestions for our recipients of funding. Their conclusion was that our future is dependent upon the education of our youth and searched for ways to assist in that regard. We are excited about a new


mobile program offered by the Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum, "Mollusks on the Move." It delivers a highly interactive program experience in which a museum staff member brings live mollusks to the school. The presentations focus on the importance of observing the natural world, mollusk feeding habits and reproduction, and marine conservation and protection. An educator will set up live tanks and allow students to visit and ask questions about our local mollusk species. What a great way to introduce the students to the local shell animals. "Mollusks on the Move" will be funded by the Marco Island Shell Club and scheduled for the following schools next year:

- · Marco Island Middle School
- Tommie Barfield Elementary School
- Golden Gate Elementary School
- · Golden Gate Middle School
- Manatee Middle School

18 classes at the Marco Island schools and 10 classes at the Golden Gate and Manatee Schools will have the opportunity to participate.

Marco Island Shell Club will also help fund an outdoor classroom at Rookery Bay Research Reserve used for Collier County students' educational study trips. The outdoor class will need some screen

walls to protect the children from many bugs in this estuary, and an industrial fan and benches for the students' comfort. The arts will be included as four Marco Island Academy students will design and paint a mural at the outdoor classroom area. We will also provide 10 summer institute scholarships for students entering the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade who have shown an interest in marine science. This scholarship will pay for a 5 day program hosted by Rookery Bay Reserve staff and local researchers. The program brings students into the field to experience concepts in ecology, marine biology, sustainability and citizen science.

We also have two endowments at Florida Gulf Coast University. The scholarship amounts are based on how much interest we received on the endowments. The University selects the undergraduate recipient, and the University will also send the scholarship committee a list of graduate applicants to be considered for selection. Our endowments will fund the scholarships for these marine biology or environmental science students.

These are just a few of the ways the Shell Club helps students of all ages learn about our beaches, shells and marine life.

Since the inception of the food grill at Residents' Beach, cup lids and straws have never been served.

Little things you may not notice or realize also are in play. Condiments, such as mustard, ketchup, etc., are in a dispenser that you place directly onto your plate. No little packets at the Grill! Of course, many product deliveries are made to the Grill in cardboard boxes. These boxes are flattened and taken to the recycling center.

So sit back, relax and order that wrap or burger that you have been eyeing, knowing that you are helping your environment and wildlife, and you are not contributing to the mounting pile of plastic!

With support from those in our community who believe in this vision and the goal of eliminating poverty housing, Habitat for Humanity of Collier County has spent the past 41 years helping families purchase a safe, affordable home. More than 2,140 families and 5,100 children have realized the independence and stability that come from having the security of owning their own home.

As season comes to a close, we are grateful for the many part-time residents who give a hand-up to Habitat families. Dedicated volunteers work side by side with future Habitat homeowners building, sawing, hammering and painting on the job-site making sure a sturdy, safe home will be purchased by each grateful family. That is only part of the Habitat program. Volunteers teach required classes in budgeting, home maintenance, living in a community and English as a second language for those who need it. With nearly 2,000 families inquiring each year about purchasing a Habitat home, volunteers play an integral role in determining which families have the greatest need and those that will best partner with Habitat through our Selection Visit process.

For year-round residents with spare time over the summer, a helping hand is always welcome at Habitat Collier. There is always something to do! Our two ReStores are happy to have extra help. The flow of applicants is constant throughout the year. Those interested in doing a Selection Visit will learn the personal story about a family who needs a better home in which to raise their children. We often hear this is one of the hardest, yet most rewarding, volunteer experiences.

There is always a steady flow of applicants working on Marco Island applying for a Habitat home. Many are those who make life on Marco Island so delightful by working in restaurants, country clubs, and golf courses.

Cindy, a recent applicant, applied for a Habitat home with the dream of giving her 3 year-old daughter, Kairi, the house of her dreams. They currently live with extended family in one small room in a mobile home in a high risk area. The room is so small it only contains their beds and a few belongings. They share the bathroom, kitchen and laundry. Cindy gets up 3 hours before work to use the bathroom before her housemates. She is a Housekeeping Team Leader at the Marriott on Marco Island. When describing her living situation Cindy said "Sometimes I have to wait to feed Kairi if others are occupying the kitchen. Laundry takes hours, if not days, to complete."

Cindy is among those recently approved applicants who will be purchasing a home in our newest community, Dockside, located off 951 near U.S. 41. Families will begin purchasing their homes and moving in this spring. Dockside is Habitat Collier's first multi-unit, town-house style complex with both 3 and 4 bedroom condominiums. When complete, 44 families will call this home. This will be a convenient location for those working on Marco Island. Each year about 8 families who work on the Island apply for a Habitat home. Today there

are nearly 100 families living in Habitat homes who work on the Island.

Affordable housing is virtually non-existent in Collier County with the exception of Habitat homes. Much has been done but so much remains. Last year 20 families inquired for each home we are able to fund, build and sell, leaving 19 families to return to their untenable living conditions. Thanks to all who have volunteered or donated their time, talents and treasures. Every helping hand makes a difference! All of us at Habitat Collier are grateful to those who have helped us get one step closer to the day when everyone has a simple, decent place to live.

This nesting season a new adult male has paired up with Calusa, the Marco Island Nature Preserve and Bird Sanctuary's (MINP) adult female eagle. Bald eagles are a state and federally protected species. They are traditional to their mates and their nest throughout their lifetime. In Florida, eaglenesting season is October through May. Currently, there are two large eaglets in the nest ready to fledge.

This year, MINP invited the Tommie Barfield Elementary School's (TBE) fifth grade classes to name The Preserve's current adult male eagle. Fifth Grade Team Leader, Mabel Pena, directed each student to write a paragraph explaining the name they chose and why. Each fifth grade class voted their choice to be placed on a ballot. One hundred and ten students participated and five names were put on a ballot for a collective fifth grade vote. "Herb" for Herb Savage received the most votes and Bertha Guzman submitted the original proposal.

On the 147th day of the school year at TBE, Herb was officially announced as the name of the new male eagle at the MINP during a broadcast to students on their Morning Show.

Bertha read "Hello! Did you hear about the bald eagle and that we get to name him? Well, in my opinion, I feel he should be named Herb, after Mr. Herb Savage. He was and still is a very important part of our country and community. In other words, he was a patriot, he fought for our freedom, and as

you know, the bald eagle stands for freedom. In conclusion, I feel that the bald eagle should be named Herb, after Herb Savage".

Bald Eagles have resided on The Preserve since the early 1970s. In Marco Island the Bald Eagle is on the City's logo and is also the mascot for the Marco Island Charter Middle School. In the Spring of 2011, MINP sponsored an Eagle naming contest at TBE for the pair of resident eagles. The 5th graders chose Paleo and Calusa. Last year, Paleo had a deadly encounter with the powerlines.

In appreciation for the student's participation in the eagle naming, Carl Way, President of the MINP,

presented a monetary contribution to TBE for the school's media center.

Including bald eagles and burrowing owls, MINP has 17 species of birds. The Preserve has also been home to gopher tortoises and a bobcat with cubs. The vision for the MINP is to preserve the land, protect wildlife for future generations, and educate children and adults about the importance of our ecosystems and environment. The Marco Island Nature Preserve and Bird Sanctuary is a 100% volunteer, 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization. Hurricane Irma Review Committee Helps Ready City for 2019 Season

At the beginning of this year the City's ad hoc Hurricane Irma Review Committee issued a final report outlining its assessment of how the City of Marco Island government and its residents prepared for, responded to and is recovering from Hurricane Irma.

In the fall of 2017, the City Council asked several Island residents with hurricane disaster experience, who were also present during Hurricane Irma, to serve on an ad hoc review Committee and to provide a report back to them no later than the end of 2018. I was honored to Chair this effort and work with island residents: Margie Hapke, Ron Myers, Allyson Richards and Bill Tipton.

We met often throughout 2018 interviewing government officials, residents, volunteers and other participants to glean their experience, insights and recommendations. We were very ably assisted throughout by Mr. Chris Bryne who is the City's Disaster Recovery Coordinator and was our liaison during the review. Our charter from the City Council was to "identify actionable improvements."

The following main areas were highlighted in the report:

- City Leadership
- Coordination with the County, State and Federal Agencies
- Emergency Communications
- Debris Removal
- Preparedness Resources
- Disaster Planning and Training
- Budget Resources

Additionally, the Committee felt that the City and its residents needed to renew its commitment

to adopting a year-around atmosphere and focus on hurricane/disaster preparedness and community resilience.

The Council accepted the report at their January 7, 2019 meeting and committed to support the majority of findings and to provide additional resources in this year's budget. I would encourage everyone to read it and share the information withtheir neighbors prior to this year's hurricane season.


