50 Years of Art for Marco

In 1969 Marco Island was transforming from a small village into a desirable resort community. The population was roughly 1,000 people. Seven artists gathered and recognized the need to establish a cultural art hub on the developing island. The Art League of Marco Island was incorporated on April 15, 1970. Marco pioneer, Helen Tateo provided space in her art studio and gallery so that Art League artists would have a place to paint and exhibit their work. In April 1970, the first Annual Fine Art Show was held at the Marco Island Shopping Center.

What was missing was a true home for the Art League. There was a vision to develop the building on Winterberry Drive in multiple phases. This vision was realized through multiple steps from 1978 through to 2002. Essential to the growth of the Art League was a gentleman who would be known as Mr. Art League. Charlie Horn was an artist, instructor, fundraiser, board member, board president and ultimately Chairman of the last capital campaign which was completed in 2002. One of Charlie's first achievements in 1995 was to secure a donation for \$50,000 while playing pool with the donor.

However, as the Art League of Marco Island approached its 40th Anniversary, it was beset with financial troubles. The year was 2009 and the world was in the throes of the Recession. The membership, class enrollment and art sales were all declining. Desperate times called for innovation and an aggressive campaign to save the Art League. Volunteer consultant, Dave Rice, arrived on the scene with a plan. Project Rescue kicked off in November of 2009. Failure could likely lead to closure of the venerable Art League. The Project Rescue committee of volunteers sprang into action to implement new efforts to secure funds and engage the community at large. The campaign was successful in bringing artists, businesses and the larger community together.

Unfortunately, the Art League continued to struggle from 2010-2014. The board of directors again faced the possibility of closing.



But it didn't happen and the organization rose like a phoenix from the ashes to reach new heights and experience greater success than it had ever known.

Enter Rosemary Wick. She would serve as President from 2012- 2017 becoming the longest serving board president in the history of the organization which was renamed Marco Island Center for the Arts. Rosemary was known for her fundraising skills as well as her tremendous passion for art, culture, music and literature. This iconic woman played an essential role in transforming a struggling art organization into a thriving community asset. From 2014 to the present, The Art Center has rebounded. The budget more than doubled and the membership is at an all-time high. Programming has increased and includes art exhibitions, over 200 classes and workshops for adults, programs for children and youth, a music series, presentations, exciting events and more.

Marco Island Center for the Arts celebrates 50 years of bringing art to the island and beyond in 2020. The future looks bright and the story goes on...

Everglades Restoration Full Steam Ahead! Why it matters to Southwest Florida

To start this new year, I spent three days at the annual Everglades Coalition Conference on Captiva Island. This year's conference theme was "All Hands on Deck," an important sentiment, given Florida's challenges with toxic blue-green algae, red tide, flooding, nutrient pollution and more. Attendees from local, state and national environmental organizations filled the venue and shared one common message – expedite Everglades restoration now!

When South Florida was first developed, important wetlands and swamps were drained to make room for people, agriculture and businesses. That draining dramatically altered how water moves through the ecosystem and in our rivers, lakes, and wetlands. These changes protected residents from major flooding and made South Florida habitable for a growing population, but had unintended consequences on our water management system. Everglades restoration is an ongoing effort to restore, preserve and protect the South Florida ecosystem while providing for other water-related needs of the region, including water supply and flood protection. The year 2020 is going to be the biggest one yet in Everglades restoration. Let me share with you what's ahead.


Groundbreaking for the Caloosahatchee Reservoir C-43



With Governor DeSantis in Tallahassee, we continue to make major strides in protecting Florida's waterways and precious natural resources statewide. Less than 48 hours after taking office, he signed a historic executive order entitled Achieving More Now For Florida's Environment that focused on accelerating key water quality and Everglades restoration projects. In his order, Governor DeSantis identified more than two dozen projects that must be fast-tracked and completed.

One event that has Everglades advocates everywhere excited is the groundbreaking for the Stormwater Treatment Area (STA) at the Everglades Agricultural Area (EAA) Reservoir Project site. STAs, as they're called by water managers, are manmade wetlands that help remove nutrient pollution from water. The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) is building the 6,500-acre water cleansing STA to complement the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' large storage reservoir that can hold water until it's needed.

The show opens at 9a.m. and closes at 3p.m. The spectator fee for this show is \$5.00, with children under 10 free. 100% of the funds collected by the Kiwanis Club are used to support the children of our neighborhood. Personally, I'm also looking forward to progress on the Picayune Strand Restoration Project this year. Once fully complete in 2023, 55,000 acres of the Picayune Strand State Forest in Collier County will have been restored to its natural state. Along with rebuilding freshwater wetlands, the Picayune Strand Restoration Project will improve estuarine water quality and reduce unnatural freshwater flows. Restored natural areas like this aren't just good for the environment, but they also help clean water headed to the coast and provide places for water to go in extreme weather events.

Another project underway is the Caloosahatchee Reservoir, which will store local stormwater runoff and water releases from Lake Okeechobee. The health of the Caloosahatchee Estuary depends on it having the right mixture of freshwater and saltwater, and this reservoir will help achieve the proper balance. In addition, a final report from a study to improve the reservoir's water quality is expected later this year.

Finally, we're celebrating significant milestones on several projects around other parts of the SFWMD to help move water through the entire South Florida system to the right places. The east coast will have a water-cleaning STA for the St. Lucie Estuary. Located on approximately 12,000 acres on the northern side of the St. Lucie Canal in western Martin County, the C-44 Reservoir and STA project will capture local basin runoff and Lake Okeechobee releases. The reservoir will store 50,600 acre-feet of water, the equivalent of roughly 861,000 backyard swimming pools. The STA component will treat the water to reduce nutrient loads and improve water quality, which will upgrade the overall health of the St. Lucie Estuary and the Indian River Lagoon.

And there are several projects to help get more water into the parched Everglades National Park, including the expedited completion of the S-333N water control structure, the removal of miles of Old Tamiami Trial roadbed, and relocation of some historic powerlines. The water control structure is expected to be completed by June 2020.

As you can see, there is a lot happening in the SFWMD during this exciting year for Everglades restoration. It has been an honor to serve as part of the Governing Board during these historic times in restoring America's Everglades. Marco islanders, as well as everyone living in Southwest Florida, know just how important water quality is to our continued economic prosperity and quality of life. There is no time to waste.

The first 60 years of my life I was blessed with a sharp mind and the ability to excel in many sports! In 2015 I was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia. Soon after, I lost the ability to run and eventually could barely walk. I found myself filled with many unpleasant thoughts and emotions.

Now I am "disabled", and my mind is not so sharp. Prior to my diagnosis I felt invincible. I took these gifts that I had been given for granted. I started to realize that my entire life I really had never given much thought to people with disabilities! Sure, when I saw someone in a wheelchair, I felt sorry for them. But I never thought much beyond that. Looking back, I am somewhat embarrassed that I was so caught up in my own charmed life, that I hadn't paid

much attention to those with less fortunate physical and mental abilities.

Over the past five years however I have learned a few things about life and about me. Prior to my diagnosis, I was a decent pickleball player and had become addicted to the sport. So, despite the obvious frustration I was experiencing, I started playing pickleball in a wheelchair. It changed my life and I eventually became competitive once again. But what has really changed for me the most is my desire to get other wheelchair people involved in pickleball. Last year, my wonderful artist wife created a painting which became the cover of the Official Program for the US Open Pickleball Championships. With the help of several of my pickleball friends, we sold raffle tickets and posters at the Open, and raised enough money from the proceeds to purchase three sport wheelchairs. We donated the chairs to East Naples Community Park and Marco Island Racquet Club. Since then I have been teaching people mobility skills for wheelchair pickleball. Last year at the US Open we had six wheelchair participants. Everyone had a great time! At this year's Open, we will have at least 14 wheelchair participants. My goal is to continue to work on the growth of wheelchair pickleball as long as I am able.

Now I am obsessed to show other wheelchair people how much fun and enjoyment they can have playing pickleball.

One thing is for sure; the friends I have made on the pickleball courts at the Marco Island Racquet Club and East Naples Community Park are the main reason I am still in the game.

When you see people playing pickleball in a wheelchair, you are witnessing individuals that are playing, competing, laughing, and in general, excelling at life!

That's how we "Roll"!!!!

Clean Boating - For the Fish, For You!

Whether it's fishing or just enjoying a day out on the water, boating regularly is one of the best benefits of living in Southwest Florida. However, boating also has the potential to introduce pollution directly into the water. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has a Clean Boater Program to promote the awareness of, and practices that, can keep our waterways clean. Being a clean boater is easy, just check out these tips!

- Proper fueling Be attentive and don't leave the gas pump unattended when fueling to prevent a spill. Also, consider buying technology that helps to prevent fuel spills.
- Spill cleanup Keep absorbent pads on hand to use for gas/oil spills in the boat or on the water.
- Boat cleaning Use non-toxic cleaners and ensure that wash water goes into the grass rather than a drain or down the boat ramp and back into the water.

- Protect plants and sea life Pay attention to signage for manatee zones and protected areas. Remember to walk or pole a boat out of grass beds.
- Don't litter Stow all loose items to prevent them from being blown into the water and especially don't throw anything overboard.
- Hazardous waste disposal Dispose of used paints, oils, and batteries properly at Collier County's recycling centers.
- Human waste management Use pump out facilities and properly maintain your onboard toilet.
- Clean Marinas Support marinas in the area that have taken extra steps to gain "Clean Marina" certification to prevent pollution. They deserve everyone's support.

Wildlife Turf Battle at the Marco Island Nature Preserve and Bird Sanctuary - Hoo is in the Nest?

Mother Nature has altered the status of the eagle's nesting this year on the Marco Island Nature Preserve! The Preserve's nesting eagles, Calusa and Herb, typically would have prepared their nest and started the mating process by now, thus producing fledglings by the April/May timeframe. Instead, in late September, a pair of great horned owls began squatting in the eagle's nest and are currently residing in the nest.

Like the bald eagle, the great horned owl is a protected species. They are known for stealing the nests of other large birds for their own mating process but do not always win over the nest long term. These owls are the earliest nesting bird in North America, often laying eggs weeks or even months before other raptorial birds. A few

years ago, the eagle pair on the Island Country Club golf course lost their nest to a pair of great horned owls but the eagles regained their nest the following year. Great horned owl hunting activity tends to peak between 8:30p.m. and 12:00a.m. and from 4:30a.m. to sunrise. Great horned owls can however, learn to target certain prey during afternoon daylight when prey is more vulnerable. Adult great horned owls range in length from 17" to 25", and possess a wingspan of 3 to 5 feet, with females being somewhat larger than males. With its very powerful talons, the great horned owl can crush the bones of its prey to make it more compact for carrying.

Calusa and Herb have been seen flying in and out of the Preserve and occasionally perching in






trees, but not the nest tree. If the great horned owl is sitting on eggs in the nest, it is very unlikely the eagles will be using their nest this season. We look forward to the eagles visiting the Preserve over the late spring and summer months as they have for many years and to their return to the nest next nesting season in the fall.

The eagle cam will be kept live and the great horned owl nesting activity can be viewed on www. MarcoIslandNaturePreserve.org. The Preserve is a bird sanctuary with approximately twenty plus species on the property. Viewing telescopes for adults and children were recently installed at the Preserve so visitors can enjoy observing bird activity.

This spring, walking paths will be established in the Nature Preserve and a gazebo will be constructed this summer for educational gatherings. Many commemorative pavers have been installed along the front of the preserve in honor of local residents and visitors. The Marco Island Nature Preserve and Bird Sanctuary is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, 100% volunteer organization.

America's Boating Club Offers Educational Courses and Seminars

Our waterways and beaches are just two of the many attractions of Marco Island. Many residents, as well as visitors, enjoy boating and other watercraft activities, and America's Boating Club - Marco Island is proud to be one of the premier organizations that offers both educational and social opportunities on the island.

The club offers many educational courses and seminars that are open to the public. All taught by certified instructors, courses include: America's Boating Course, which teaches basic boating knowledge, what to do when meeting another boat in a crowded waterway and how to recognize and handle hazards; Boat Handling, which focuses on understanding the nautical rules of the road, docking and undocking, anchoring, emergencies on board, knots and line handling; and Marine Navigation,

which focuses on navigation on recreational boats using GPS as a primary tool, while also teaching traditional techniques so a boater will still be able to find his or her way should GPS fail. While most of the courses are classroom based, the club does offer on-the-water training, too.

Seminars include information on use of VHF/DSC radios, what to do if your captain is incapacitated and you find yourself "suddenly in command," along with how to prepare your boat for a hurricane.

In addition, the club offers free Vessel Safety Checks conducted by certified Vessel Safety Examiners. The examiner makes recommendations as well as discusses safety issues to help make you a better, safer, boater. Items checked on your vessel include: proper display of numbers, proper registration documentation, PFDs/life jackets, visual distress signals, fire extinguishers, ventilation, navigation lights and sound producing devices.

The club provides many other benefits, all with the goal of making boaters and boating safer and more enjoyable. Additional details are available at marcoboatingclub.org.



Audubon Western Everglades' Burrowing Owl Watch Program

Who doesn't love the charismatic Florida Burrowing Owl? You may be surprised to learn the second largest population of these beautiful raptors is here in Collier County on Marco Island. And they are spreading out! Owls are moving into Isles of Capri, Fiddlers Creek, and even the City of Naples.

The Florida Burrowing Owl (Athene cunicularia floridana) is a state-listed "threatened" bird whose original habitat is the native grasslands of interior Florida. Since the 1950s, urbanization has reduced available habitat, and the owls' numbers have declined considerably. It was listed for increased protection by the state in 2017.

Ironically, in Florida the two largest populations of these owls are in cities – Marco Island and Cape Coral. That's due to the abundance of cleared, sandy

vacant lots, which resemble their native grassy range. The University of Florida and Audubon Western Everglades have been collaborating in recent years on research to determine how the owls have so successfully colonized urban areas, and how to keep their populations sustainable as these urban areas build out. To accomplish that, since 2018, Audubon Western Everglades has hired biologist Alli Smith to apply leg bands to young and adults, with about 100 owls now banded. She also oversees sixty trained volunteers who monitor all nests in the east Naples and Marco Island area during nesting season, which is from mid-February through mid-July.

The most important research question is addressing loss of urban breeding habitat. Audubon Western Everglades staff has been working with

Marco City Council and Vice-chair Jared Grifoni who proposed a Starter Burrow Incentive Program with small cash grants for any voluntary starter burrows which attract owls to dig. If this strategy works, it could help stabilize Marco Island area owls and be a model for the state.

The Owl Watch Program was started in the late 1990's by the City of Marco's first staff biologist, Nancy Richie, who first counted less than a dozen owls. When she handed the program off to Audubon Western Everglades in 2016, there were about 125 pairs nesting. This past nesting season, our volunteers counted 241 pairs which raised 563 chicks! Many Marco residents are now engaged in owl-watching, and even students at Tommie Barfield Elementary have become involved with an owl family that nests at the school.

The presence of burrowing owls does NOT prevent people from building on their property; they merely need to get a special permit from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to collapse the burrow outside nesting season. The number to call FWC dispatch on any wildlife violations is 888-404-3922.

- 1) Keep cats and pets indoors;
- 2) No pesticides and rodenticides near burrows;
- 3) Drive carefully at night;
- 4) Join Audubon Western Everglades; and
- 5) Adopt an Owl or consider a starter burrow!

The "Year of the Cat" now becomes the "Years of the Cat" as the Smithsonian Institution loaned Key Marco Cat and other rare Pre-Columbian Native American artifacts on loan from the University of Pennsylvania continue on exhibit until April 3, 2021 at the Marco Island Historical Museum (MIHM).

This important and historic exhibit — a collaborative effort between MIHS and the Collier County Museums — was recognized with the 2019 Florida Association of Museums Award for Museum Excellence — the highest honor for a museum in the state of Florida. Among other 2019 honors, MIHS was recognized by the Southeastern Museums Conference (SEMC) for the expanded exhibit Paradise Found: 6,000 Years of People on Marco Island in which the Key Marco Artifacts are showcased.

MIHS staff members also have received 2019 honors. MIHS Curator of Collections Austin Bell received an appointment as a Consulting Scholar at the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology in Philadelphia. In addition, Collections Manager Heather Otis was awarded the Southeastern Registrars Association Travel Scholarship for Emerging Professionals to attend the 2019 SEMC conference in Charleston, South Carolina.

According to MIHS Executive Director Pat Rutledge, "We are so proud of our great professional team members as well as our partners and supporters who have made it possible for us to reach for excellence in everything we do in our work to preserve and present the fascinating and important history of our area to residents and visitors from throughout the world."

Activities of Friends of Tigertail

Friends of Tigertail is having a busy season, with beach clean-ups, community presentations, and educational sessions.

Partnering with Collier County on September 21, 2019, for the International Coastal Clean-up, 70 volunteers, including kayakers who were able to reach mangrove areas inaccessible to walkers, collected and tabulated 70 pounds of trash, part of the world-wide effort to clean our coastlines.

Another beach clean-up was held on December 7, 2019, hosting 30 volunteers who gathered more than 30 pounds of debris. Additional articles that were too large to haul back were picked up later by the county. We look forward to upcoming beach clean-ups on April 18, 2020, as part of the annual Bay Days/Keep Collier Beautiful county initiative, and again on July 11, 2020.

Our group has been working with the Hideaway tax district and others for the past year to publicize an issue occurring in Big Marco Pass near the lagoon. Over time the area just north of the lagoon has become extremely shallow, restricting tidal flow, and if not mitigated will eventually completely close off the lagoon, affecting ecological balance and water quality. Friends of Tigertail hosted an informational presentation for the community on September 18, 2019, where Dr Mohamed Dabees,



an engineer with Humiston and Moore who studied the issue, described the status of the lagoon, offering solutions to the problem.

Everything is included with the earth box kit except the soil. The planter comes with a watering tube, a set of caster wheels for easy moving, fertilizer, dolomite and plastic cover. The plastic

cover keeps in moisture. The instructions explain exactly how to add the dolomite and fertilizer into the soil, where to plant, and how to water. And the best part – no weeding!

As a new decade begins, more than 2,200 families are grateful for the hand-up offered to them by Habitat for Humanity of Collier County and our generous partners. Volunteers came out in force to start the New Year building our three new Habitat communities, one in Immokalee and two in Naples. Dockside and Vincent's Acres, our two Naples communities located off Collier Boulevard, are ideal locations for those working on Marco Island. Each year about 8 families working on Marco Island are approved to purchase a Habitat home.

In January 2020, six new families were qualified and approved to purchase a Habitat home. Two of those families work on Marco Island. One family, Lovenson and Maniolita, just welcomed a brand new baby boy four months ago. Sadly, their cramped efficiency apartment was barely big enough for the two of them without the addition of an infant. Their dream is to give their son a safe and decent home where he can learn to crawl and walk. Eventually they hope to have a yard where it is safe for him to play outside and make friends with neighbor children.

Lovenson works full-time at JW Marriott on Marco Island in Events Services. His full-time schedule has him working nights and weekends. Maniolita was an accountant in her native Haiti which has proved helpful as they manage their tight

budget. Now that their son is here, Maniolita plans to go to school to become a phlebotomist. This hard-working couple is determined to purchase their home and provide their son with a bright future.

Christina was also approved in January to purchase a home where she will raise her children. She works two jobs to make ends meet. Christina has been in housekeeping at Hideaway Beach Club for 2 years, plus she works at Winn Dixie. Rent for their two bedroom apartment is over \$1,300 per month. Even so, Christina has saved enough money to bring her two older children, son Felipe and daughter Fatima, here from Mexico. She is saving now to bring her younger daughter to the US. Christina was born in the US but her children were born in Mexico so it has been more of a struggle than she expected. Christina's dream is to have her three children reunited and living in a safe and decent home in the United States.

Habitat Collier remains focused on our singular goal of making homeownership a reality for hardworking, low-wage earners like Christina, Lovenson and Maniolita, who make life enjoyable for all who live in Collier County. You know these workers and likely see them every day at places such as Publix, The Island Country Club, CVS, many restaurants and golf courses that we enjoy. Affordable housing is virtually non-existent for these workers in Collier County with the exception of Habitat homes. Rents and home sale prices continue to skyrocket. The number of low cost rental units in Collier County, renting at less than \$800 per month, has decreased 65% since 2011. Even so, occupancy for overpriced rentals is at 98%.

Thanks to the generous support of our many partners throughout Collier County, especially our friends on Marco Island, Habitat Collier continues to offer a helping hand to those who qualify and complete our rigorous application process, hoping only that they will finally have an affordable, stable home where their children may grow and thrive. Each of the families now living in a Habitat home is eternally grateful for every gift of time, talent and treasure that made it possible for them to realize the American Dream of owning a home of their

own. They have left behind unaffordable, unhealthy and unsafe living conditions. Your hand-up has given families the chance to have a solid foundation through homeownership.

Please consider joining us for a Habi-tour or home dedication ceremony. Habi-tours will leave from the Habitat office, 11145 Tamiami Trail East, at 9 a.m. on January 22 and February 11, 2020. You will learn about the need for affordable housing in Collier County and how Habitat Collier and our partners address it. Home dedications are the time when volunteers, donors, and new Habitat homeowners come together to share the results of their work as homes are blessed and dedicated. Dedications happen throughout season with two scheduled in Dockside on February 8 and 15, 2020 at 10 a.m.

Twice Habitat for Humanity of Collier County was honored to be among the 1% of charities to have earned a perfect 100 score from Charity Navigator, the largest and most utilized evaluator of charities in the U.S. Additionally, Habitat Collier has received fifteen four-star ratings from the nonprofit watchdog. In 2014, Habitat Collier was recognized as #1 in the nation for Housing and Community Development. 95¢ of every donated dollar is used to build homes and serve families. Habitat Collier earned the 2019 Platinum GuideStar Nonprofit Seal of Transparency, the highest level of recognition offered by GuideStar.

Coast Guard Auxiliary Announces Safe Boating Course Schedule for 2020

As we enter another season, Flotilla 95, in our 53rd year serving Marco and the 10,000 Islands, has announced the 2020 schedule for our safe boating classes.

The mission of the Coast Guard Recreational Boating Safety Program is to minimize loss of life, personal injury and property damage, and to prevent negative environmental impact associated with recreational boating. Flotilla 95's educational programs, which are taught by USCG certified instructors, make these programs available to the public. You need not own a boat!

Boating Skills & Seamanship

This course covers a variety of important topics and provides information that will help attendees become better boaters. Topics covered include: Rules of the Road, "Highway" Signs & Navigation, Equipment, Boat Handling, Boating Laws, Safety, Radio Operation, Lines & Knots and weather.

This 20-hour course meets twice a week (Mondays and Thursdays) for 4 weeks. There are 2 scheduled courses, which begin January 13 through February 6, and March 2 through March 26, 6:30-9:00p.m. Cost: \$60.00. A textbook will be provided.

Boaters Local Knowledge - Marco Island

This class provides practical information on how to navigate the various waterways in and around Marco Island. Aerial and on-water videos and photos are used throughout the course and allow attendees to actually see the local areas. This class is recommended for novice and intermediate boaters, or those new to the area.

Dates for this 4-hour class: February 19, March 16 & April 13, 9:00a.m.-1:00p.m. Cost: \$60.00

Top Spot Chart N204, available at most marinas, is strongly recommended for this class for marking routes and hazard areas.

Boaters Local Knowledge - Backwater Edition

This class begins where the Marco Island Area class ends, and provides those who want to fish and explore the backwaters of the 10,000 islands with information they will need to safely navigate this unique area. Geography, tides, routes and other navigation factors are thoroughly discussed. Aerial photos are used extensively. This class is recommended for intermediate boaters and above.

Momentary power interruptions

A brief loss of power is sometimes frustrating but it is a sign that technology is working to prevent a much longer power outage. Typically, a momentary outage lasts less than five minutes allowing for protective devices on the electric grid to open and close in response to a fault. A fault can be caused by a variety of things like storms, tree branches, animals, vehicle accidents, or equipment failure. Without these protective devices, electric facilities could be damaged requiring manual replacement or repair which takes time and can be costly. Coastal areas and regions with extensive vegetation and wildlife are more prone to momentary outages. LCEC continually monitors these types of outages and makes adjustments when possible.


